WHAT IS PACT?

Parents and Children Together (PACT) is a unique parenting education and support program for parents with a developmental disability or cognitive limitation that began serving the community in 1984.

PACT is designed to meet individual learning styles and benefit parents not able to successfully participate in traditional parenting classes.

HOW DO FAMILIES ACCESS PACT SERVICES?

- ♥ Parents are welcome and encouraged to contact the PACT office themselves.
- ♥ Parents can be referred by child protection case workers in Adams, Denver, or Jefferson Counties.
- ♥ Other professionals working with the family (attorneys, therapists, health care providers, etc.) are welcome to contact PACT for further information regarding initiating services through the family's child protection case worker.

WHO IS QUALIFIED AND MAY BENEFIT FROM PARTICIPATION IN PACT PARENTING SERVICES?

FAMILIES MUST:

- have at least one parent with a developmental disability manifested before age 22 which results in cognitive limitations and significant functional impairments requiring specialized educational methods and assistance in life activities.
- have a child birth to 13 years of age.
- actively participate in the program.
- have an open child protection case in Adams, Denver or Jefferson Counties.

PARENTS WHO MAY BE APPROPRIATE FOR SERVICES MAY:

- have attended special education classes in school.
- be unable to fully understand traditional time-limited, lecture-oriented parenting classes.
- be socially isolated because of financial instability and/or lack of social supports and skills.
- benefit from individualized support to strengthen parenting skills and address issues of child neglect and abuse.
- be receiving SSI (Supplemental Security Income) benefits or services through a local CCB (Community Centered Board).

WHAT SERVICES ARE OFFERED TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE PACT PROGRAM?

1. Personalized in-home parenting skills training by qualified Parent Educators.
2. Initial 90-day assessment followed by quarterly progress reports.
3. Development of a written Individualized PACT Plan for Support
4. Implementation of an individualized in-home parenting curriculum.
5. Home safety screening and supplies.
6. Family guidance, support, and resource coordination.
7. Group social/educational events with door-to-door transportation or travel reimbursement.
8. Crisis intervention and emergency problem-solving.
9. Child car seat and equipment loans.
10. Limited emergency financial loan assistance.
11. Referrals to appropriate community resources.
